Nepal has already gained herd immunity since cases are down. so the vaccine is not needed.

This is not correct. We do not know what level of herd immunity is needed to stop transmission of COVID-19. It would be dangerous to depend on herd immunity through natural infection as natural infection carries a real risk of serious diseases and death.

Vaccines in use against COVID-19 are safe and efficacious. The vaccine used in Nepal is already listed by WHO for emergency use. So far, almost 430,000 doses of the vaccine have been administered safely in Nepal. This includes vaccination in health care workers of Nepal. India, Bangladesh and Nepal are also using the COVISHIELD vaccine produced by Serum Institute of India which is the same as the AZ vaccine

According to the World Health Organization, the people who have recovered from Corona Virus infection need to be vaccinated as there is the possibility for re-infection. The vaccine must be administered because it's not certain how long the antibodies produced following the recovery from the infection stay in the body and whether the immune response post infection would be strong enough for subsequent infection. As recommended by the National Immunization Advisory Committee of Nepal, the vaccine should be given at least 4 weeks after recovering from COVID-19.


